



Tobacco Prevention Program Goals

Four goals guide our comprehensive program

1. Prevent initiation of tobacco use

- 2. Eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke
- 3. Help tobacco users quit their addiction
- 4. Eliminate tobacco related health disparities among populations




Comprehensive Programs Work Adult Smoking, Alaska and U.S. 1996-2013

Last Frontier Leading the Way

- Leading the nation: e-cigarette policy & media
- Petersburg voters adopted a \$2 per pack and 45% wholesale of Other Tobacco Products (OTP), including e-cigarettes, plus local registration
- Kotzebue and NW Arctic Borough increased the tax to \$2.20 per pack and 55% wholesale of OTP, plus local license
- Sitka increased the tax to \$2.46 per pack and 90% wholesale of OTP including e-cigarettes





Last Frontier Leading the Way

- Improved smokefree laws in Juneau.
 Increased tax to \$3 per pack and 45% wholesale OTP, including e-cigarettes
- Mat-Su Borough increased their tax to \$2.30 and 55% wholesale OTP including e-cigarettes
- 113 tribal resolutions across the state
- 33 Gold Star school districts, 4 Silver Star, and 1 Bronze Star










Health Disparities in Alaska Tobacco Use



Smoking Prevalence by Mental Health Markers





Smoking Prevalence by Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)








Youth E-Cigarette Use, 2015
