APPENDIX F: YEAR 2000 HEALTH OBJECTIVES

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services published Healthy People 2000: National Health Promotion and Disease Prevention Objectives¹ to comprehensively address health promotion and disease prevention opportunities in order to allow local communities and states to choose from among its recommendations in addressing their own highest priority needs. The table below provides a brief comparison of some of these objectives compared with Alaska vital statistics from

1998 through 2000. Note that in 1999 and 2000, causes of death were classified using ICD-10, while deaths during 1998 were classified using ICD-9. Thus the death rates in 1998 are not directly comparable to the death rates in 1999 and 2000. Similarly, the death rates in 1999 and 2000 are not directly comparable to the Year 2000 Health Objectives, since the Health Objectives were developed using ICD-9 and causes of death in 1999 and 2000 were classified using ICD-10.
