Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs,

Description of Services: The Division of Behavioral Health seeks to support specific types of services that are provided by individuals who qualify as peer or consumer support services practitioners or peer support specialists. Peer support is an approach that integrates personal experiences or “lived experiences” in recovery with behavioral health treatment and recovery supports for individuals, family, and youth with Serious Mental Illness, substance use/misuse disorders, Serious Emotional Disorders, and/or Co-occurring Disorders. Peer supports will identify with at least one of the above- described experiences and by demonstrating acquisition of core competencies to provide services through training and/or experiences. The goal is to provide accessible and effective evidence-based services through peer support. Services will be provided in integrated community environments or in institutions and/or community based intensive programs as a transition into less intense community environments. The Division will embed peer support practitioners throughout Alaska who will provide outreach and engagement to improve the quality of life for clients.

Assessment of Need: In October 2024 the State of Alaska Division of Public Health released an updated report highlighting that drug overdoses remain a significant contributor to mortality in Alaska and represent an ongoing public health concern. Between 2022 and 2023, drug overdose death rates in Alaska increased substantially across most drug categories, resulting in a 47% rise in the overall drug overdose death rate. Consequently, Alaska recorded its highest ever drug overdose death rate in 2023. This trend is contrary to the national pattern, where overdose death rates decreased in 2023 for the first time since 2018. There is an ongoing need for both treatment and recovery services, including Recovery Housing, which is a crucial part of the continuum of care for substance use disorders.

Service Delivery Area: The service areas and communities requested for the services solicited are statewide.

**Behavioral Health
Alcohol Safety Action Program (Adult and Juvenile)**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.31 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act.

The Alcohol Safety Action Program services are intended for adult and juvenile clients who have a current or pending misdemeanor criminal case with the Alaska Court System for driving while intoxicated and/or other alcohol and drug related misdemeanor cases. Services provide case management and accountability to clients by 1) screening criminal cases referred from the district court into drinker classification categories, and risk/need screenings as well as 2) managing misdemeanor alcohol offender cases to ensure their required substance abuse education or treatment program are completed, as prescribed by the courts and activities are reported back to the court for disposition.

Assessment of Need: The Alcohol Safety Action Program is an integral part of the Alaska Court System and the Behavioral Health continuum of care, providing invaluable and necessary substance abuse services in all major communities throughout Alaska. Maintaining our current Alcohol Safety Action Program system of service in our major Alaskan communities is vital to our goal of reducing alcohol use, abuse and dependency across our state.

Service Delivery Area: Service areas include Juneau, Ketchikan, Kodiak, Fairbanks, Dillingham, Copper River, Bethel, Palmer/Wasilla, Anchorage, Kenai/Homer, Seward, Nome, Kotzebue, and Barrow.

Behavioral Health

Bethel Community Service Patrol and Sobering Center

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 18.08.010, AS 44.29.150, AS 47.30.477, AS 47.30.520 - 620, AS 47.37, and 7 AAC 71.010 - 71.300 Community Mental Health Services, and 7 AAC 29 State Standards for Alcoholism Programs.

Bethel's Community Service Patrol will patrol the town, picking up inebriated individuals and deliver them to the appropriate facility for assessment. If needed, Community Service Patrol will transport them to the Yukon Kuskokwim Health Corporation Sobering Center where they can sober up in an environment that provides monitoring and protection. Individuals taken to the Yukon Kuskokwim Health Corporation Sobering Center will also be screened and receive case management services that connect them to services, such as referrals for Substance Abuse or Mental Health assessments and treatment.

Assessment of Need: The Bethel region has been identified by the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority as a target area for specialized chronic inebriate services due to the large number of Title 47 protective holds that result in people being taken to local correctional facilities or hospital emergency rooms. Neither of these facilities have the capacity to provide services for those needing care. The Community Service Patrol is an integral part of a multi-faceted service system designed to provide protection, identification, and referral for treatment for the targeted population. The Yukon Kuskokwim Health Corporation Sobering Center provides a more appropriate and preferable setting, than the local correctional facility or emergency room.

Service Delivery Area: Bethel Service Area. Available data documenting incarcerations associated with protective custody holds demonstrates that the City of Bethel has one of the highest incidences of protective holds in the State. Because of this, the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority and Division of Behavioral Health have identified the region as a priority for additional program efforts.

Behavioral Health CBHTR Outpatient Treatment

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7 AAC 78-Grant Programs, AS 47.30.475. The Comprehensive Behavioral Health Treatment and Recovery program is operated to ensure Alaskans have access to a statewide continuum of behavioral health (mental health and substance use disorder) services across the lifespan. The Comprehensive Behavioral Health Treatment and Recovery program coordinates community-based, person-centered services and supports for abstinence and improved health, wellness, and quality of life for those with, or at risk of behavioral health issues. This program includes outpatient mental health treatment services, outpatient substance use disorder treatment services, and psychiatric emergency services.

Assessment of Need: In the 2020 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey (BRFSS), 10.5% of Alaskans reported frequent mental distress (14 or more days per month). Alaska Native adults reported frequent mental distress at 13.4%. Alaska's 2020 suicide rate of 27.5/100,000 was over twice the 13.48/100,000 U.S. rate. Alaska Natives complete suicide at 2.4 times the rate of non-Alaska Natives. Alaska has the 5th highest rate of frequency of adult binge drinking in the U.S. and the second highest economic cost per capita of excessive alcohol consumption. The Alaska Native adult rate of alcohol-induced mortality is over 4 times (110.3/100,000) that of all Alaskan adults (26.3/100,000) and is over 9.5 times the national rate (11.4/100,000). 66% of Alaskan adults report one or more Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) growing up with one or more adults experiencing behavioral health issues, which for children translates to more expensive acute care and chronic conditions later in life.

Service Delivery Area: Statewide, by Department of Health Regions, or by Alaska Medicaid Section 1115 Behavioral Health Demonstration Waiver Regions according to need.

The Division of Behavioral Health seeks to support specific types of services that are provided by individuals who qualify as peer or consumer support services practitioners or peer support specialists. Peer support is an approach that integrates personal experiences or lived experiences in recovery with behavioral health treatment and recovery supports for individuals, family, and youth with Serious Mental Illness, substance use/misuse disorders, Serious Emotional Disorders, and/or Co-occurring Disorders. Peer supports will identify with at least one of the above-described experiences and by demonstrating acquisition of core competencies to provide services through training and/or experiences. The goal is to provide accessible and effective evidence-based services through peer support. Services will be provided in integrated community environments or in institutions and/or community based intensive programs as a transition into less intense community environments. The Division will embed peer support practitioners throughout Alaska who will provide outreach and engagement to improve the quality of life for clients.

Assessment of Need: According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Peer support workers are people who have been successful in the recovery process who help others experiencing similar situations. Through shared understanding, respect, and mutual empowerment, peer support workers help people become and stay engaged in the recovery process and reduce the likelihood of relapse. Peer support services can effectively extend the reach of treatment beyond the clinical setting into the everyday environment of those seeking a successful, sustained recovery process. Ongoing research on peer support, published in Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration The Value of Peers, shows promising findings such as: reduced use of inpatient services, decreased self-stigma, decreased costs to the mental health system, and decreased hospitalization. Peer support has existed in behavioral health for decades. Its rapid growth in recent years is for good reason. Research and experience show that peer support specialists have a transformative effect on both individuals and systems. Peer support has been shown to improve quality of life; improve engagement and satisfaction with services and supports; improve whole health, including chronic conditions like diabetes; decrease hospitalizations and inpatient days; and reduce the overall cost of services. Peer support empowers people to make the best decisions for them and to strive towards their goals in their communities. Peers are an essential component of recovery-focused systems and are key across settings and stages of recovery. Utilization of peer support is, by now, a common practice in many fields in the medical world of today.

Service Delivery Area: Statewide. Resource allocation will assure a distribution of grant funds across the state.

The Comprehensive Treatment and Recovery Substance Use Disorder Residential Treatment/Withdrawal Management Services program is operated to ensure that Alaskans have access to a statewide continuum of these services across the lifespan. This program coordinates community based, person-centered services and supports for abstinence and improved health, wellness and quality of life for those with substance use disorders and with co-occurring substance use disorders and mental health issues. Services may include residential treatment and/or residential withdrawal management (detoxification).

Assessment of Need: There is a very high need for Substance Use Disorder Residential and Withdrawal Management Services in Alaska, evidenced by the utilization rate and the number of individuals on the wait lists for these services, as well as the high number of calls received at the Division of Behavioral Health requesting these services. This has accelerated over the past few years due to the opioid crisis and the Covid Pandemic. Also, the majority of individuals with Substance Use Disorder who are in need of this level of treatment have little to no income or private health insurance. Thus, it is essential that the State provide access to Substance Use Disorder programs that accept Medicaid and/or charge on a sliding fee scale, which these grants require of providers.

Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, This program is governed under 7 AAC 78. Additional governing statutes are AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act, 7 AAC 70 Behavioral Health Services, 7 AAC 135 Medicaid Coverage for Behavioral Health Services, AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act, AS47.30.655-.915 Alaska Civil Commitment Statutes, 7 AAC 70 Behavioral Health Services, 7 AAC 135 Medicaid Coverage Behavioral Health Services, 7 AAC 138 1115 Substance Use Disorder Waiver Services, 7 AAC 139 1115 Behavioral Health Waiver Services, and 7 AAC 160 Medicaid Program.

The Alaska Department of Health (DOH) will utilize grant funding for a dedicated planning year to prepare for the state-wide implementation of the Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) model. This initiative is designed to expand access to coordinated, comprehensive behavioral health care across Alaska, with an emphasis on reaching vulnerable populations. CCBHCs will provide services to individuals of all ages, regardless of their financial situation, location, or specific behavioral health needs. DOH will certify one urban and one rural CCBHC, developing a comprehensive certification system to support this process. DOH will establish a sustainable PPS for Medicaid-reimbursable behavioral health services, using historical cost data and national benchmarks to set rates. DOH will apply to participate in the 4-year CCBHC Demonstration Program to ensure long-term financial stability for CCBHCs. During the first year, the project will focus on planning and preparation for the demonstration period.

Assessment of Need: Behavioral health conditions significantly contribute to the disease burden in the US, with depressive and substance use disorders ranking among the top 10 causes of death and disability for adults. In Alaska, 28,000 adults have a serious mental illness and 8,000 Alaskans ages 12-17 have depression. In February 2021, 43.1% of adults in Alaska reported symptoms of anxiety or depression and 26.5% were unable to receive needed therapy. Of the 29,000 adults in Alaska who did not receive needed mental health care, 42.1% did not because of the financial cost. Additionally, 12% of Alaskans (age 12+) reported needing, but not receiving treatment at a specialty facility for substance use in the past year. Access to care is extremely challenging for much of Alaska's population due to the state's expansive geography and inclement weather, and extremely high shortages of specialized care providers. This lack of specialized training and care within the workforce and in Alaska communities creates challenges for residents with or at risk for behavioral health conditions. Medically Underserved Areas/ Populations (MUAs/MUPs) cover 95% of Alaska's land mass and 78% of the state's population. The data highlights the critical needs within the state.

Service Delivery Area: The State of Alaska will work with behavioral health clinics in urban and rural areas through a RFP with two application groups: urban and rural. For this RFP, the state will select CCBHCs based on the populations they serve. Population is based off the borough or census area population from the Alaska Population Estimates which defines the population estimates by borough, census area, and economic region. Urban areas, consists of boroughs/census areas with a population of 20,000 people or more. Rural areas, consists of boroughs/census areas with a population of 19,999 people or less. DBH will partner with one urban and one rural applicant to pursue CCBHC certification.

This funding seeks to provide resources to improve the mental health outcomes for children and youth, birth through age 21, at risk for or with serious emotional disturbances (SED), and their families. This program supports the implementation, expansion, and integration of the System of Care (SOC) approach by creating sustainable infrastructure and services that are required as part of the Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services for Children and their Families Program (also known as the Children's Mental Health Initiative or CMHI). With this program, the aim is to prepare children and youth with, or at risk of, SED for successful transition to adulthood and assumption of adult roles and responsibilities. Among required activities are: provision of evidence-based and culturally appropriate mental health services to children and youth with or at risk for SED, including those from diverse populations; provision of diagnostic and evaluation services, outpatient services and medication management, intensive day treatment and home-based outreach and case management; mental health crisis emergency services; provision of referral pathways; training to service providers; development and maintenance of collaborative partnerships; therapeutic foster care; and incorporation trauma and grief informed care.

Assessment of Need: Alaska is in need of enhanced behavioral health services for children and youth, as indicated by several sources, including CMS (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services) 1115 Evaluation deliverables, Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (YRBS) / Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) data, SAMHSA Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) data, and the recent 2022 Department of Justice (DOJ) report of Behavioral Health services for Alaska's children. An example of Alaska's need is that Alaska has one of the highest suicide rates in the nation; in 2020, the leading cause of death for people ages 15-24 was suicide. Suicide attempt rates in Alaska are on an increasing trajectory. This SAMHSA grant will assist Alaska in better ensuring the smooth transitions of children and youth between emergency departments, inpatient behavioral health facilities, and outpatient care, aiming to reduce unnecessary out of state, out of community, and psychiatric hospital placements.

Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention and Early Intervention Services

Program services will assist and support efforts to reduce and prevent substance use and abuse, behavioral health crisis interventions, suicide, and self-destructive behavior. The overall goal of this program is to support coalition-lead community-based activities across Alaska by reducing risk factors and harmful consequences of substance abuse and poor mental health, and to promote protective factors to empower communities to create population-level change in behavioral health conditions. Increasingly, integrated Behavioral Health services requires a broader view of substance use and mental health problems and to look more holistically and to partner with initiatives that target interpersonal violence, trauma, primary care and physical health issues.

Assessment of Need: The Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention and Early Intervention program is an integral part of the Behavioral Health continuum of care. This program funds coalitions to initiate and support community-based training, education, and other behavioral health strategies throughout Alaska to increase shared protective factors among individuals, families, and communities to reduce substance abuse and misuse, and local challenges. This network of coalition-lead initiatives operates at the local, regional, and state levels and is vital for promoting a safe and healthy environment for children and families across the state and results in reduced health care costs and a lower burden on the legal and criminal justice system.

Behavioral Health First Episode Psychosis

The First Episode Psychosis program is an evidence-based practice to identify and serve individuals in their teen years or during early adulthood who have had or are at risk of having their first episode of a psychotic disorder. Research has demonstrated that early, appropriate treatments and supports can help to prevent the full onset of illness for persons in a high-risk state, and to improve long-term outcomes for those who have already had a first episode of psychosis. Services are a team-based, multimodality approach to treating first episode psychosis. Component interventions include community outreach, assertive case management, individual or group psychotherapy, supported employment and education services, family education and support, and low doses of select anti-psychotic agents.

Assessment of Need: National research has demonstrated that approximately 100,000 adolescents and young adults experience first episode psychosis each year.

Service Delivery Area: Given the low incidence of youth with early psychosis, this model requires a service area population size of at least 100,000. Expectations of numbers served once a team is fully functional is 15 to 25 depending on the size of the community. Due to the remoteness of Alaska, a proposed service area with a population size of less than 100,000 will be considered, if the applicant demonstrates need and capacity to meet the target number of clients served. One to two grant awards will be funded.

The purpose of this program is to provide comprehensive suicide care within healthcare settings to Alaska's youth, ages 10-24. This will be accomplished through piloting the Zero Suicide initiative. Services will work to increase the capacity of healthcare providers to identify, assess, manage, and treat youth at risk of suicide, and to improve the continuity of care and follow up of youth identified to be at risk, including those who have been discharged from the emergency department.

Assessment of Need: Alaska has one of the highest suicide rates in the nation, and in 2020, the leading cause of death for people ages 15-24 was suicide. Suicide attempt rates in Alaska are on an increasing trajectory. Consequently, our acute care settings have experienced an influx of patients admitted for suicide risk. In line with these recent efforts to create robust suicide care practices within our acute care settings, the Division is pursuing avenues to support acute care providers in implementing screening, assessment, and brief intervention practices for suicide risk. Furthermore, capacity and workforce obstacles frequently prevent the timely transition of youth and young adults from emergency departments to inpatient behavioral health facilities or outpatient care.

Permanent Supportive Housing is a well-established Evidence-Based Practice characterized by the provision of comprehensive support services in inclusive community settings, combined with affordable rent options. It serves as a critical resource for individuals contending with behavioral health issues that have hindered their ability to maintain stable housing and integrate into the community successfully. Housing with integrated support acts as a dependable foundation for the journey to recovery, especially for those experiencing homelessness, residing in unnecessarily confined or segregated environments, or transitioning back to the community from institutional settings. This grant program offers a wide range of active treatment services, including but not limited to: assertive outreach and engagement to bring individuals into services including camp outreach to homeless individuals; linkage to affordable housing and housing stability services; linkage to employment support services/job skills training; substance abuse treatment and coordination; linkage to mental health treatment and coordination; referral to primary care services; activities of daily living services and training; linkage to medication management and monitoring; referral detoxification services; relapse prevention and recovery planning; and illness management and recovery. Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness is a federal grant program under the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)'s Homeless Division. As such these funds can only be used as per the purpose and requirements of the SAMHSA Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness program.

Assessment of Need: Individuals with physical or mental illness and substance use are highly represented in the chronically homeless population. One criteria of the Department of Housing and Urban Development definition of chronic homelessness is that the individual has a disability in addition to experiencing homelessness. Alaska participates annually in the nation Point in Time Count which uses surveys of people in encampments, homeless shelters, soup kitchens, etc. to estimate the number of homeless people in communities and nationwide. This grant funding provides outreach and engagement to our most vulnerable individuals who are homeless. This is an activity that is not reimbursable through Medicaid but facilitates access to housing and treatment services, as well as providing assertive outreach activities that have been proven to reduce hospitalizations and incarcerations.

The Alaska Department of Health (DOH) is launching a new grant program to enhance and expand Syringe Service Programs (SSPs) across the state. This initiative aims to strengthen community health and safety by funding up to three agencies to build or support existing SSPs to advance their services in key areas, including: Capacity and Partnership Building: Foster collaborations and strengthen organizational infrastructure to enhance SSP effectiveness. Connection to Treatment: Facilitate seamless pathways to substance use disorder treatment and recovery services. Overdose Prevention and Response: Expand access to naloxone and provide education on overdose response strategies. Infectious Disease Prevention: Reduce the spread of HIV, hepatitis, and other infections through safe syringe distribution and disposal. Health and Safety Promotion: Educate communities on harm reduction practices and safer substance use. Basic Needs and Support Supplies: Provide essential items such as hygiene products, clothing, and food to SSP participants. Program Expansion: Increase the geographic reach and service capacity of SSPs to underserved areas. Integrated Primary and Behavioral Health Care: Offer comprehensive care, integrating mental health and medical services into SSPs. This grant program seeks to empower agencies to address public health challenges effectively, reduce harm, and support Alaskans in achieving healthier outcomes.

Assessment of Need: In 2023, Alaska experienced its highest recorded overdose death rate, with at least 364 fatalities - a sharp increase, primarily driven by fentanyl, marking the highest year-over-year rise in the nation. The Anchorage area reported the highest overdose death rate (48 per 100,000), followed by Matanuska-Susitna Valley (29.2), Southeast Alaska (27.7), Interior Alaska (23.1), and the Gulf Coast (18). Men accounted for 65% of overdose deaths, with the highest rates among those aged 35-44 (28%), followed by 25-34 (23%). Emergency department visits for opioid-related incidents were most frequent in Anchorage (50.4 per 10,000), with males twice as likely to require emergency care compared to females. Polysubstance use, particularly involving methamphetamine and fentanyl, drives a significant proportion of deaths, with 62% of fatalities between 2018-2022 involving multiple drug categories. This crisis underscores the need for the effective intervention of syringe service programs. SSPs are shown to increase treatment initiation and substance use abstinence, and to reduce overdose deaths and Hepatitis C and HIV transmission.

Service Delivery Area: The service delivery area will encompass the following State regions: Anchorage, Gulf Coast, Interior, Mat-Su, Southeast, and Southwest.

Promoting the Integration of Primary and Behavioral Health Care

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

The purpose of the Promoting the Integration of Primary and Behavioral Health Care: Collaborative Care Model is to support implementation of the Collaborative Care Model (CoCM). The CoCM improves care for mental and substance use conditions in primary care settings. Care is provided by a primary care team and includes a case manager, consulting psychiatrist, and other mental health professionals. This integrated care approach is patient-centered and evidence-based. State agencies participating in this program will work with at least three primary care practices to develop the staffing and systems necessary to implement the CoCM.

Assessment of Need: Access to behavioral health care is a persistent problem. According to the 2022 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, of the 59.3 million adults aged 18 or older who had a mental illness in the past year, about half (29.3 million people) did not receive mental health treatment. Of the 19.4 percent of people aged 12 or older who had a need for substance use disorder (SUD) treatment (54.6 million people), only 24 percent (13.1 million people) received any substance use treatment. As a result, there is a need to improve access to whole-person health by increasing capacity for primary care settings to identify and connect people to integrated physical and behavioral health care. A range of research has shown the Collaborate Care Model to be effective in improving outcomes for individuals with mental health needs by providing treatment through primary care settings.

Service Delivery Area: Service delivery area for this funding opportunity is statewide. Service delivery to underserved populations is encouraged by this funding opportunity.

Behavioral Health Recidivism Reduction

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 620 Community Mental Health Services Act, and 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act.

The Division of Behavioral Health's Recidivism Reduction Program is a comprehensive initiative aimed at reducing recidivism rates among individuals transitioning from incarceration to the community. Through a combination of case management, utilization of evidence-based Level of Service Inventory-Revised assessments, and collaboration with the Department of Corrections and community partnerships, the reentry program strives to enhance successful reintegration and promote long-term positive outcomes for reentrants. Grantees will have the option to choose one of two routes to delivery services (1) a strictly case management model or (2) a hybrid reentry community coordinator and case manager model. The hybrid reentry community coordinator and case manager position was established in response to feedback from previous grantees who highlighted the necessity of coalitions providing case management services in smaller communities. Recognizing this existing role, this new position was developed to enhance coordination and effectiveness by combining both case management and coalition responsibilities. By implementing this combination of focused case management, the utilization of the Level of Service Inventory-Revised score, and collaborative partnerships, the Division's Recidivism Reduction Program has been designed to address the complex needs of reentrants effectively. The goal is to provide individuals with the tools, support, and opportunities necessary to break the cycle of recidivism, promote successful reintegration, and contribute positively to their communities.

Assessment of Need: Resources are needed to improve and enhance the quality of life for formerly incarcerated individuals and promote public safety by providing intensive case management services to address the underlying criminogenic factors that result in individuals recidivating.

Behavioral Health Residential Care for Children and Youth

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.40.011 Purchase of Services for Minors; AS 47.10 Children in Need of Aid; AS 47.12 Delinquent Minors; AS 47.14.100 Power and Duties of Department Over Care of Child; 7 AAC 50.100 Community Care Licensing.

The Residential Care for Children and Youth program provides short-term, family-focused, residentially based emergent and ongoing residential care designed to provide a safe, supervised, therapeutic alternative to more restrictive levels of care, including but not limited to acute longer-term residential (psychiatric) or juvenile detention of youth with serious emotional disturbance. Residential Care for Children and Youth services include emergency shelter, specialized residential care, staffed secure care, residential diagnostic treatment, and residential sex-offender treatment. Lengths of stay range from one day to approximately a year or more. A strong emphasis is placed on service delivery to children in their own communities whenever possible. Services are intended to achieve immediate and long-term solutions to family problems; promote the preservation, rehabilitation, and reunification of families to the extent possible; and to promote independence and the use of least restrictive alternatives. Services are provided for children and youth with behavioral health residential treatment needs, and to stabilize and assess for needs including the rehabilitation of juvenile offenders and treatment of victims of child abuse and neglect.

Assessment of Need: Under AS 47.14.100, the Department must arrange for the care of every child committed to its custody by placing the child in a foster home or in the care of an agency or institution providing care for children inside or outside the state. The same statute allows the Department to pay necessary costs to ensure adequate care.

Rural Human Service System**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act.

This program offers grants to rural substance abuse, mental health, behavioral health, and human services agencies, and to urban agencies serving people who are traveling or have relocated from rural areas. The program was developed in response to the critical need for a stable system of behavioral health providers in rural Alaska by hiring, training, supporting, and supervising culturally competent village-based counselors and counselors that serve relocated villagers. This program provides the opportunity for rural people to achieve their goal of helping their own people. Training is provided through the Rural Human Services Training Program in the University of Alaska College of Rural Alaska from one of its designated Rural Human Services campuses and supports a range of degree programs from a two-year certificate to Masters Degree of Social Work.

Assessment of Need: This program seeks to address the problem of scarcity of counseling and crisis intervention resources in the villages of rural Alaska and to reduce the costly reliance on itinerant service providers and employees who come from outside of a community, only to stay a year or less. The goal of the project is to ensure there is “a counselor in every village” as well as secondary behavioral health specialists where needed to provide continuity of care and consistency in community-level services.

Behavioral Health Rural Peer Support

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-620 The Community Mental Health Services Act; AS 47.30.520-620 (Community Mental Health Services Act), and AS 47.376, Uniform Alcoholism and Treatment Act.

This program will expand and implement community-based peer support services into rural areas across the state. This would integrate peer support into community mental health centers and clinics in rural areas to add to their existing service delivery system. The intent is to promote growth and institutionalization of peer support in behavioral health systems outside Anchorage, Juneau, and the Fairbanks areas. The Division anticipates the following outcomes: increased number of peer support organizations actively serving members/individuals in rural communities, increase workforce in remote locations, and improved client quality of life outcomes for individuals engaged in peer support services. By having peer specialists, who are members of the communities in which they work; they are well positioned to provide culturally sensitive services to the population. Their understanding of their community allows them to develop close relationships with the people they serve, improving quality of care.

Assessment of Need: Peer support is a recognized best practice in behavioral health. Peer support is an evidence-based practice for individuals with mental health conditions or challenges. Both quantitative and qualitative evidence indicate that peer support lowers the overall cost of mental health services by reducing re-hospitalization rates and days spent in inpatient services, increasing the use of outpatient services. Individuals who have completed treatment or are successfully managing their recovery are often very successful in engaging and supporting their peers in the recovery process. This prevention program aims for peer support professionals to engage clients in recovery and assist with navigating treatment options within the community. Having trained peer support workers in rural areas would also help alleviate the workforce issues faced in remote areas of the state.

Service Delivery Area: Preferably locations off the roadway system.

Assessment of Need: Supported Employment represents a well-established best practice, supported by substantial research that underscores the connection between employment and recovery from severe mental illnesses. Within this initiative, employment services have been designed and refined to boost client participation in supportive employment activities. The primary aim is to empower individuals to achieve greater independence, enhance their overall quality of life, and secure employment that not only benefits them but also contributes positively to their families and the broader community.

Behavioral Health Therapeutic Court

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act; AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act.

Under the Therapeutic Court Program, the agency provides a range of services integrating behavioral treatment, sanctions, and incentives with case processing. The focus is on a high-risk population of chronically dependent clients and/or individuals with a co-occurring mental health disorder.

Assessment of Need: The Therapeutic Court Program seeks to solve underlying problems that generate repeated encounters with the criminal justice and behavioral health system. In a 2007 report, Criminal Recidivism in Alaska, the Alaska Judicial Council found that graduates of therapeutic courts were rearrested and re-convicted far less frequently than comparison offenders. In the study, the Council followed graduates for one year after they completed their program and a comparison group of offenders for one year after they were released from serving their sentence.

Service Delivery Area: The service areas and communities to be served are primarily Anchorage, Bethel, Fairbanks, Juneau, Ketchikan, and Matanuska-Susitna Borough, and may include outreach to other communities seeking to establish a therapeutic court program locally. Individuals receiving services will be referred by the Therapeutic Courts.

Child Care Licensing Program services include: recruiting, licensing, monitoring, and providing information and technical assistance to individuals/applicants interested in becoming licensed, and licensed child care facilities within the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA); processing applications for licensing; processing exempt from licensing applications; determining qualifications and eligibility of the child care administrator; obtaining valid criminal history and child protection check results on child care facility staff; completing announced and unannounced provisional, annual, health and safety monitoring, and renewal inspections of child care facilities; conducting investigation procedures for licensed and approved child care facilities, facilities exempt from licensing, and facilities operating illegally within the MOA; and finalizing administrative hearing practices for the child care facilities within the MOA. The department retains overall responsibility for the management of child care licensing efforts in the state. This involves enforcing rules and regulations governing the program, overseeing the expenditure of funds by the grantee, monitoring services, and ensuring the grantee operates within their scope of work. The Municipality of Anchorage enforces municipal child care codes that, at a minimum, must meet state regulations.

Assessment of Need: The intent of the Child Care Licensing Program is to reduce the risk of predictable harm to children and support services to child care providers. In accordance with AS 47.32.030, the department may delegate its powers relating to licensure of child care facilities to a municipality that has adopted an ordinance providing for child care licensing under the home rule powers under AS 29.10.010 or as authorized under AS 29.35.200-29.35.210. These powers have been delegated to the Municipality of Anchorage since 1998.

Commodity Supplemental Food**

The base Commodity Supplemental Food Services grant award will provide increased access to nutritious foods for low-income elderly over age 60 through distribution of commodity foods, as well as providing information about those commodity foods, general nutrition education, and referrals to other health resources. The FY26 Emergency Food Assistance Funding Plan will provide rapid emergency food funding statewide through established partnerships. The FY26 Emergency Food Assistance Funding is a separate funding source and not restricted by demographic or income.

Assessment of Need: Low income senior citizens in Alaska are at a nutritional risk because they may not get enough food to eat. The relative need among geographic areas and populations for expanding or providing services is evaluated by determining the percentage of seniors whose income is 130% of the federal poverty level (FPL). The USDA has permitted the expanded threshold of 150% poverty level (up from 130% FPL) for the CSFP income guidelines, which can be implemented in January 2025 or later. The State of Alaska plans to utilize this increase in FPL threshold prior to or on July 1, 2025 for the beginning of the SFY26 grant cycle. The FY26 Emergency Food Assistance Funding will be provided to established partners who are anticipated to experience an increased need for services within their communities. Base CSFP guidelines for assessment of need do not apply to this funding.

Service Delivery Area: Anchorage, Mat Su Valley, Kenai Peninsula, Fairbanks, Southeast Alaska, and some outlying communities when transportation is donated or otherwise provided through in-kind support.

This grant provides funding to develop work experience opportunities in remote villages, increasing program capacity to support Alaska Temporary Assistance Program Work Services participants as they prepare and engage in work and work experience placements.

Assessment of Need: The Administration for Children and Families sets standards for parents receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families benefits for participating in work or community work experience activities and the hours of participation. States that don't meet the federally mandated participation rate targets are subject to financial penalties; this grant will help avoid significant financial penalties. Families in remote villages outside the central hub communities have very limited opportunities for potential work experience placements and other activities that meet the Federal definition of "countable" towards the mandatory participation rate.

Service Delivery Area: Rural villages located within the Nome census area with the exception of the City of Nome which is currently served by the State Public Assistance office.

Native Family Assistance Program (NFAP) grants are used to augment federal Tribal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funds and comprise a significant portion of Alaska's TANF Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement. The Native Family Assistance Program grants will be used by eligible grantees in accordance with state Temporary Assistance for Needy Families regulations. Native Family Assistance Program grants are primarily used to pay cash benefits directly to needy families, assisting them in moving from reliance on welfare to self-sufficiency through employment, cash assistance, supportive services, diversion payments, and associated case management services.

Assessment of Need: Tribal organizations receive federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families funding based on Alaska's 1994 Aid to Families with Dependent Children caseload and expenditure data for Native Alaskan / American Indian families residing in the service area of the eligible Tribal entity. The Native Family Assistance Program grants are needed to supplement the federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families funds and help to make the Tribal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Programs, 'comparable' to the State of Alaska's Alaska Temporary Assistance Program.

Service Delivery Area: Service areas are defined by the boundaries of each of the eligible Alaska Native entity's responsible for the administration of a Native Family Assistance Program and are included in their federally approved Tribal Family Assistance Plan.

Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, USDA Regulations 7 CFR Part 246

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is a federal assistance program of the Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) under the United State Department of Agriculture (USDA) which provides nutrition assessment services, nutrition education, breastfeeding support, free nutrient-rich foods and community referrals to low-income pregnant women, infants and their mothers, and children up to their fifth (5th) birthday who are found to be at nutritional risk. Mother to mother support has been shown to be one of the most successful approaches to promoting breastfeeding. The WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Program (BFPC) is a targeted approach to provide mentorship on breastfeeding and encourage WIC participants to breastfeed.

Assessment of Need: For the past fifty years, the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) has been focused on decreasing food insecurity among the nation's low-income mothers and children. Alaska WIC has been achieving the same goal since its inception in the mid-1980's. WIC targets services for pregnancy and early childhood because these are critical periods of growth and development. By providing access to healthy foods, nutrition education and breastfeeding support, the WIC program improves the health of nutritionally at risk, low-income women, infants, and children. Research has shown that participation in the WIC program results in longer pregnancies, fewer premature births, fewer infant deaths, and savings in health care costs from \$1.77 to \$3.13 for every one dollar spent on WIC services.

Service Delivery Area: Statewide Alaska's Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) services will be provided by at least one WIC Local Agency (grantee) in each of the twelve (12) Service Areas. Service Areas are defined by geographic borders for boroughs and census areas. The WIC Service Areas are: Aleutians East Borough / Aleutians West Borough, Municipality of Anchorage, Bethel Census Area/Kusilvak Census Area, Bristol Bay Borough/Dillingham Census Area/Lake and Peninsula Borough, Denali Borough/Southeast Fairbanks Census Area/Yukon Koyukuk Census Area, Fairbanks North Star Borough, Kodiak Island Borough, Matanuska-Susitna Borough/ Kenai Peninsula Borough/ Chugach Census Area/ Copper River Census Area, Nome Census Area, North Slope Borough, Northwest Arctic Borough, Southeast Alaska which includes Juneau City and Borough/ Haines Borough/ Hoonah-Angoon Census Area/ Ketchikan Gateway Borough/ Petersburg Borough/ Prince of Wales-Hyder Census Area including Metlakatla/ Sitka City and Borough/ Skagway City and Borough.

The Community Health Centers - Senior Access Program (CHC-SAP) will increase access and delivery of primary care to Alaska seniors (persons age 65 years and older) through Alaska's Community Health Centers (CHCs). Funding will support direct services that help alleviate strain on Community Health Centers and increase the availability of primary care for seniors. These services may include, but are not limited to, provider and community education, media promotion, financing of direct services provided to Medicare recipients, partial financing of salaries for providers who serve Medicare recipients, outreach services, group sessions for patients with chronic disease, and other primary care services as identified by the needs of the Community Health Center.

Assessment of Need: In this current and growing primary care crisis for seniors with Medicare as primary insurer, seniors are being refused care by physicians due to Medicare's low reimbursement rate. In some parts of Alaska, Community Health Centers are often the only providers available and/or willing to see Medicare patients. During the 2024 grant year, 11,600 seniors over the age of 65 (approximately 9% of Alaska's Medicare enrollees) received services through the Senior Access Program provided by more than 8 Community Health Centers throughout the state.

Service Delivery Area: Statewide by catchment areas of participating Section 330 Community Health Centers. Only Alaska Community Health Centers receiving federal funds via the US Public Health Services Act, Section 330, may apply for these CHC-SAP grants.

The selected grantees will support activities specifically aimed at developing, implementing, and/or expanding comprehensive and collaborative efforts across the Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) that specifically address the relationships between opioids, stimulants, and other substances (including alcohol) with the carceral system. These efforts will initiate and/or further develop collaborations across multiple sectors including but not limited to public health, behavioral health, and public safety to identify opportunities for intervention and diversion from incarceration.

Assessment of Need: Alaska's substance abuse rates and the carceral system are characterized by high incarceration rates and a significant prevalence of drug-related issues. The state has an incarceration rate of 744 per 100,000 people, which is higher than any independent democratic country. The carceral system in Alaska faces challenges such as increased recidivism rates, significant corrections costs, and the prevalence of people with mental illness intersecting with the justice system. The state is also dealing with acute shortages in the workforce and the need to improve services for victims of crime. Alaska's drug and alcohol misuse patterns have shifted over the past two decades, with prescription opioids once comprising 52% of substance abuse treatment admissions in 2010. Fentanyl was involved in 60% of all drug overdose deaths statewide in 2022. The state's Indigenous populations and rural regions have been disproportionately affected by this ongoing substance use challenges.

Service Delivery Area: The service delivery area is Statewide across all 12 Alaska Tribal Health Regions.

Family Navigation (formerly Parent Navigation)**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

The Division of Public Health (DPH), Section of Women's Children's and Family Health's (WCFH), Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs (CYSHCN) programs work in collaboration with specialty medical providers to provide gap-filling and supportive services for children and families. Parent Navigation services "bridge the gaps" between CYSHCN families and the healthcare system. Parent Navigation links families with trained parents, advocates, or professionals who have experience with supporting families with children with special health care needs to enhance the quality of services provided to families and decrease the time it takes to access these important services.

Assessment of Need: Families frequently use Parent Navigation at points of transition or challenge: when receiving a diagnosis, when looking for the right provider, if there is an issue in school, or when preparing to transition out of school. Parent Navigation is instrumental in helping families support their newly diagnosed child. It is required for follow up efforts and resource connection. Resources in Alaska vary by region and are not always accessible to families. Children with special health care needs require individualized support in all the environments (school, home, etc.), and their families carry the burden in ensuring that these supports and needs are met. Parent Navigators meet with each family as needed and guide the family to both identify and access the supports that they need for their child. Parent Navigation considers the family as a whole and not just the needs of the individual child. Parent Navigators familiarize you with available options by offering specialized information, support, training, and community resources based on each family's unique needs. With first-hand knowledge of programs and services throughout the community, Parent Navigators act as a reference and guide. Parent Navigation services are provided at no charge to families. Parent Navigators stay involved as long as parents want them to. Parents can come back whenever you need support. Parent Navigation is available for families caring for a child with special needs from birth to age 26.

Service Delivery Area: Services are currently available statewide through clinics held in Anchorage and Fairbanks for cleft lip/palate, and several communities around the state for autism and fetal alcohol spectrum disorders. There are no formal clinics for hearing screening at this time.

According to National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians (NAEMT), The Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) model is the provision of healthcare using patient-centered, mobile resources in the out-of-hospital environment. MIH is provided by a wide array of healthcare entities and practitioners that are administratively or clinically integrated with EMS agencies and other healthcare entities. MIH may include, but is not limited to, services such as: Increasing access to care in underserved areas Providing telephone advice to 9-1-1 callers to alleviate dispatch resources Using community paramedics or other specially trained EMS practitioners to provide care for high healthcare system utilizers or patients at risk for hospital admission, readmission, chronic disease management, preventive care, or post-discharge follow-up visits Transport or referral of high healthcare system users or patients at risk to a broad spectrum of appropriate care, not limited to hospital emergency departments, federally qualified health centers, or mental health providers.

Assessment of Need: COVID-19 response has identified a gap for higher risk populations that are medically underserved in rural communities. These communities have a greater population of individuals that experience substance use disorders (SUD) and co-occurring mental and behavioral health issues. Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) is a program that provides access to appropriate care for these individuals by the delivery of services to where individuals are located.

Service Delivery Area: Statewide with a focus on rural areas and underserved populations.

HIV/AIDS Prevention**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Health Service Act, Section 201, 42 U.S.C. 241; Alaska HIV Prevention Plan, AS 44.29.020.

Services will impact HIV prevention, diagnosis, and surveillance along the HIV care continuum, including: 1) HIV prevention services, 2) HIV testing, 3) linkage to medical care for persons newly diagnosed with HIV, 4) retention in medical care for persons living with HIV, and 5) HIV status neutral care. As this grant is fully funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), all program services and interventions must be allowable under the Federal HIV Prevention funding opportunity announcement and are subject to change based on Federal requirements. Recommended interventions by the CDC may include activities such as promotion of bio-medical HIV prevention services; condom distribution; HIV testing; prevention with positives; systematically collect, analyze, interpret, and disseminate HIV data. Services which impact HIV prevention and testing at the health systems level may also be implemented.

Assessment of Need: Using epidemiological data, the HIV/STD Program has identified populations at increased risk for acquiring HIV in Alaska, including men who have sex with men, injection drug users, and high-risk heterosexuals. These populations are outlined in the epidemiological profile of Alaska's 2022-2026 Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan and have been approved by the Alaska Integrated HIV Advisory Group. Grant services will target the priority populations identified by the HIV/STD Program, as well as other priority target populations that may be identified and required by the CDC.

Program services will include analysis of current HMIS utilization, outreach to engage statewide providers and training for organizations on HMIS database entry.

Assessment of Need: In 2021, Governor Dunleavy launched the People First Initiative to address several public safety issues facing Alaska. One of the five major intersecting topics prioritized was the issue of homelessness, which called for enhanced data tracking to advance community engagement efforts and improve client outcomes. In support of this People First Initiative priority, the Department of Health, Division of Public Health, has determined the need to increase homeless tracking statewide through the Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS), an information technology system used to collect client-level data and data on the provision of housing and services to individuals and families at risk of and experiencing homelessness. Continuums of Care (CoCs) are required by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to utilize HMIS, as it is a core system to analyze trends and identify root causes within homelessness, monitor the efficacy of prevention and outreach efforts, increase support services, and address public health and safety concerns.

Service Delivery Area: The Alaska Balance of State Continuum of Care (CoC) region, which encompasses all communities in Alaska outside of the Municipality of Anchorage.

Human Services Community Matching Grants**

The Human Services Community Matching Grants, in accordance with AS 29.60.600, provide for essential human services. Essential human services are those defined as “social services” in AS 47.75.060, except that they include only services whose unavailability would subject persons needing the services to serious mental or physical hardship.

Assessment of Need: Per AS 29.60.600 each eligible political subdivision of the state will carry out a needs assessment to prioritize the proposed services and will consult with a citizens’ advisory group in consideration of services to be obtained under subawards. Applicants are required to demonstrate that services provided under subawards are essential as statutorily defined.

Service Delivery Area: AS 29.60.650 restricts eligibility to cities with populations greater than 20,000; unified municipalities with populations greater than 100,000; and second-class boroughs with populations greater than 65,000. Population is determined by the Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development. The Division of Public Health will use opioid settlement funds to support the Statewide Opioid Settlement Grant Program. Funding is to support prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and recovery activities across the state, as allowable and outlined by Exhibit E of the final settlement agreement. The Division of Public Health expects to award up to three (3) grantees per each of the seven (7) Alaska Public Health Regions, for a total of 21 grantees. Additionally, one (1) statewide grant will be awarded to provide statewide support and offer smaller subawards to organizations who were unable to apply or not awarded funding through this opportunity. Core Strategies are listed below, but a full list of allowable activities can be found in Exhibit E of the final settlement agreement. Upstream/Primary Prevention Evidence-based prevention programs in schools Education to school-based and youth-focused programs Community drug disposal Provider education Media campaigns to prevent opioid misuse Treatment & Recovery Distribution of medication assisted treatment (MAT) to individuals who are uninsured or whose insurance does not cover the needed service, including in correctional and emergency department settings Warm hand-off services MAT education and awareness training to healthcare providers, emergency medical technicians (EMTs), law enforcement, and other first responders Comprehensive wrap-around services to individuals in recovery, including housing, transportation, job placement/training, and childcare Evidence-based treatment and recovery support for neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS) babies Harm Reduction Naloxone training for first responders, schools, community support groups and families Naloxone distribution to individuals who are uninsured or whose insurance does not cover the needed service Comprehensive syringe service programs

Assessment of Need: In 2021, Alaska experienced the largest percent increase in overdose deaths of any state in the United States, losing at least 253 people to overdose, with 196 deaths attributed to opioid overdose. 150 or seventy-six percent (76%) of the deaths involved synthetic narcotics, a category that includes fentanyl. Of the 778 total overdose deaths that occurred between 2017-2021, fifty-eight percent (58%) involved drugs from more than one narcotic, sedative, or psychotropic category, including thirty-four percent (34%) that involved drugs from three or more categories. The opioid settlement lawsuits filed against multiple manufacturers and distributors assert that their business practices were a major contributing factor to the U.S. opioid epidemic. In February 2022, a \$26 billion settlement was finalized between most states and local governments. Through the state and local government agreements, Alaska will receive approximately \$58.5 million over the next eighteen years. The Statewide Opioid Settlement Grant Program is a result of these settlements.

Service Delivery Area: The Statewide Opioid Settlement Grants will be divided across the seven (7) Alaska Public Health Regions, with up to three (3) grant awards per region at approximately \$428,571 per region. Region 1: Anchorage Municipality. Region 2: Gulf Coast Region. Region 3: Interior Region. Region 4: Mat-Su Region. Region 5: Northern Region. Region 6: Southeast Region. Region 7: Southwest Region.

One (1) statewide grant for \$300,000 that is required to support statewide efforts in the areas of prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and recovery by providing subawards to entities who were not able to apply or were not funded through this competitive opportunity.

Parents as Teachers MIECHV**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, The MIECHV Program is authorized by 42 U.S.C. Â§ 711(c) (Title V, Â§ 511(c) of the Social Security Act, as amended) to support the provision of home visiting services to eligible families by states, nonprofit organizations serving states, and U.S. jurisdictions.

The purpose of the Parents as Teachers - MIECHV Program is to improve maternal and child health, early childhood development, and family well-being of pregnant women and parents with children up to kindergarten entry, especially those living in communities identified as at risk for poor maternal and child health outcomes, by supporting the delivery of coordinated and comprehensive high-quality and voluntary early childhood home visiting services to eligible families. Parents as Teachers MIECHV Program objectives are to: (1) Strengthen and improve programs and activities that address preventive and primary care services for pregnant women, infants, and children under Title V of the Social Security Act. (2) Improve coordination (3) Identify and provide comprehensive home visiting services to improve outcomes for eligible families living in at-risk communities. This grant program will utilize the Parents as Teachers (PAT) evidenced-based curriculum, as an affiliate of the program.

Assessment of Need: According to the 2017 American Community Survey (ACS) Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS) data, there are an estimated 4,952 at-risk families eligible for MIECHV services across Alaska that could benefit from evidence-based home visiting. Many areas of the state do not benefit from home visiting services in any way or are significantly underserved, given their at-risk population status. According to the Office of Administration for Children and Families, evidence-based home visiting improves outcomes for parents and children across a wide range of child ages, outcome areas, and national models. Evidence-based home visiting appears to be cost-effective in the long term, and the largest benefits from evidence-based home visiting come through reduced spending on government programs and increased individual earnings.

Service Delivery Area: As is required by the federal funder, Health resources and Services Administration (HRSA), grantees must provide services in one or more of the following areas that were identified as at-risk during the needs assessment process: 1. Bethel Census Area, 2. Kusilvak Census Area, 3. Nome Census Area, 4. North Slope Borough, and 5. Northwest Arctic Borough. Two additional at-risk communities were identified 6. Anchorage Municipality and 7. Mat-Su Borough, based on the relative size of the population in each of these communities.

Parents as Teachers**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 14.03.420 Alaska Reads Act

The Parents as Teachers (PAT) home visiting program uses an evidence-based model to deliver parent education services to eligible children, their parents and caregivers. Trained parent educators visit homes to support and build on parent and caregiver strengths, while teaching about optimal early childhood developmental learning. Grantees will be required to be a PAT Model affiliate or will complete a plan to become an affiliate in the first grant year. To become an affiliate, agencies must meet the essential components of the PAT model, which ensures each affiliate meets the minimum expectations for program design, infrastructure, and service delivery. Affiliates must also be able to offer all components of the PAT model, which includes personal visits, a resource network, group connections, and developmental screenings. Grantees will also be expected to maintain or achieve PAT National blue-ribbon status (the quality endorsement and improvement process) per the requirements of the model. All grantees must maintain active Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) Online accounts within the statewide ASQ Online system. For the purpose of program evaluation, a grantee must share data extracts from one of two approved PAT data systems as needed with the Department of Health, Division of Public Health, Section of Women's, Children's & Family Health in order to evaluate the efficacy of the program. Grantees must also share the annual performance report (APR) submission that is required by PAT National. Grantees will have more specific screening tool requirements beyond the PAT National listed options.

Assessment of Need: Grantee must support families with young children as they grow through the most critical stages of development. It is imperative that families increase their knowledge of early childhood development and improve their parenting skills. By following the Parents as Teachers home visiting evidence-based model, families receive four dynamic components to the Parent as Teachers model: personal visits; group connections; resource network; and child screening. Together these four components form a cohesive package of services with four primary goals; increase parent knowledge of early childhood development and improve parent practices; provide early detection of development delays and health issues; prevent child abuse and neglect; and increase children's school readiness and success.

Positive Youth Development Afterschool Program

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, In accordance with AS 44.29.020(a), the Department of Health is authorized to establish a youth services grant program.

The Positive Youth Development Afterschool Grant Program will fund community based and statewide prevention programs that enhance individual, family, school, and community protective factors to foster healthy youth development. While programs may provide a variety of programming to youth, a primary focus of programming will be to reduce initiation and promote quitting marijuana among youth.

Assessment of Need: This program utilizes a *More Matter's* approach to support programs that improve resilience, build connectedness between youth and trusted adults, enhance individual, family, school, and community protective factors that foster healthy development, and reduce risk for substance use among youth. The more protective factors that a youth has in their life the greater likelihood that they will not engage in substance misuse. This grant program will enhance external supports for youth like connections to trusted adults. Programming will provide youth with structured and safe opportunities to engage in peer-led, fun and culturally relevant activities during after school hours and expand external supports. There is an association between the number of external supports a youth reports and current substance use. For example, 24% of youth who reported one external support used marijuana, while only 10% of youth who reported 5 external supports used marijuana. The grant program will enhance internal strengths for youth. Programming will build on internal strengths or resiliency with youth. Internal strengths include the ability to control emotions and remain calm, and not feeling alone. Having more internal strengths is associated with less substance use. For example, 23% of youth who reported one internal strength used marijuana, while only 15% of youth who reported 3 internal strengths used marijuana. Increasing knowledge about harms, and supporting families and peers to communicate positive norms, also helps to protect youth from using different substances. Roughly three in four Alaskan youth perceive that their parents disapprove of marijuana use. Yet fewer than half of youth believe their friends disapprove of marijuana use.

Service Delivery Area: Alaska Public Health Regions: Anchorage and Mat-Su, Gulf Coast, Interior, Northern, Southeast, and Southwest, and statewide option.

Target capabilities for healthcare system preparedness and recovery include, though are not limited to emergency operations coordination; information sharing; mass care; fatality management; volunteer management; responder safety and health; and medical materials management and distribution, including medical surge and dispensing of countermeasures.

Assessment of Need: Alaska's ability to effectively respond to large scale public health emergencies, natural disasters, and man-made hazards is imperative as the public health system plays a critical role in such emergencies. An effective, broadly developed and coordinated emergency response lessens the impact of such incidents and contributes significantly to community and individual resilience following such incidents.

Service Delivery Area: Service delivery is statewide.

Public Health Nursing

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 18.05.010(a),(b)(1)(3)(4)(6)(9): The department shall administer the statutes and regulations relating to the promotion and protection of the public health as provided by law.

Public health nurses are expected to provide community and systems-based health promotion and disease prevention services to communities and regions, and direct clinical preventive services to individuals and families. Services include prevention and control of infectious and non-infectious diseases through immunizations, screening, testing, treatment, contact investigation, education and outreach; public health emergency preparedness and response activities; outreach to families and children at medical and social risk; referral and linking of individuals and families with needed services; and direct provision of health services when they are otherwise unavailable.

Assessment of Need: Currently, Alaska does not have state-run public health centers in the Municipality of Anchorage, the North Slope Borough, and the Maniilaq Association region. Grants awarded to the governing bodies, and eligible public health agencies, within these delivery areas are deemed the most effective and appropriate means of providing area-wide public health nursing services. A disruption in the delivery of these services would place residents at increased risk of infectious disease and would reduce preventive health services available to high-risk/medically under-served populations, in particular women and young children.

Service Delivery Area: The Municipality of Anchorage proposed service delivery area includes the Municipality of Anchorage and the Girdwood, Eagle River, and Chugiak communities. The North Slope Borough proposed service delivery area includes the community of Barrow and the villages of Atkasuk, Kaktovik, Nuiqsut, Point Lay, and Wainwright. Teen and Unintended Pregnancy Prevention**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

In partnership with the Division of Public Assistance, the Division of Public Health's Adolescent Health Program will collaborate with communities experiencing high rates of teen and unintended births to reduce the number of these births and improve the family's opportunities to achieve self-sufficiency. Services are aimed at boosting community educator capacity, strengthening youth leadership and involvement, improving school district relationships, and increasing youth access to reproductive and sexual health services. Through this program Alaskans aged 10-25 years will gain access to sexuality education about unintended pregnancies using abstinence primary messaging, as appropriate. Grantees will work collaboratively with health care providers, health educators, violence prevention advocates, parents, and Alaskans 10-25 years old that could experience unintended pregnancies. The goal is to also support community education on statutory rape, affirmative consent, youth friendly clinics, and positive youth development. This program will contribute to the efforts of improving youth health through decreased infectious disease, decreased teen/unintended pregnancy, and increased youth access to a medical home.

Assessment of Need: Both teen and unintended pregnancies are closely linked to a host of critical social issues that the Alaska Temporary Assistance Program aims to address, such as poverty, lack of education, high levels of relationship conflict and family turmoil, father absence, single parenthood, and various negative social, health, and economic outcomes for children born as a result of such pregnancies. Alaska Pregnancy Risk and Monitoring System data from 2020 indicates that nearly a quarter of all Alaska pregnancies resulting in a live birth were unwanted or mis-timed. Most notably, Alaska consistently ranks highest for Chlamydia rates in the US since 2000. In 2021, Alaska's Chlamydia rate was 770 cases per 100,000 and youth aged 15-19 accounted for 30% of Alaska Chlamydia newly diagnosed (State of Alaska, Division of Public Health; Section of Epidemiology, 2023). Alaska also has high gonorrhea rates. In 2021, 15-19-year-olds accounted 397.6 cases per 100,000 persons and 791.8 cases per 100,000 for 20-24-year-olds. Alaska ranks the highest in rape incidence annually in the US, with 134 reported rapes per 100,000 people (FBI Statistics, 2016). 57.7% of adult females had a lifetime prevalence of intimate partner or sexual violence (National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, 2020). Intimate partner violence can impact a young woman's reproductive and sexual health, increasing the risk for unintended pregnancies, abortions, miscarriage and HIV or STD infection (Silverman et al., 2001).

Title X Clinical Family Planning Services

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

Program services offer high quality, affordable, and confidential family planning and related preventive health services. Services will be provided on an as-needed basis, with a priority given to low-income individuals and families. This assistance must be provided in accordance with national standards of care and include, but are not limited to: comprehensive reproductive health exams; breast and cervical cancer screening; pregnancy testing, client-centered counseling, and referral for all pregnancy options; screening, counseling and treatment or referral for sexually transmitted infections and HIV; counseling for and provision of all Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved contraceptive products and natural family planning methods for clients who want to prevent pregnancy and space births; assistance to achieve pregnancy, including basic infertility services; and other preconception health services. In addition to clinical services, grantees must refer clients to other local agencies for any primary health care, clinical procedure, and screening or diagnostic tests that are not performed by the Title X-funded agency. The broad range of services paid for with Title X monies strictly prohibits abortion as a method of family planning. As a recipient of federal Title X funding the grantee must follow Title X policies and procedures for determining eligibility of clients for discounted services, as well as meeting the Title X Program and other state and federal requirements of a clinical health care services delivery site.

Assessment of Need: Many regions of the state, rural and urban, contain communities with high rates of teen and unintended pregnancies, due in large part to lack of reliable access to affordable, confidential family planning and related preventive health services. This procurement will explore the statewide interest, infrastructure capacity, and cost-effectiveness of providing Title X services from all eligible entities.

Tobacco Prevention and Control (Community Based Grants)

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 44.29.020; AS 47.05.010

Through recommendations in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's best practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program the Tobacco Prevention and Control Community Grant Program is intended to: prevent initiation of tobacco use among youth, eliminate exposure to second-hand smoke, promote tobacco cessation among youth and adults, and identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities. The Tobacco Prevention and Control Program will offer grants under two different components. Component 1 grants will support health systems change for tobacco cessation by implementing or improving evidence-based screening and referral systems. Component 2 will support tobacco prevention policy implementation and regional coalition development. Depending on the component, each grantee will work to provide services in their region and collaborate with other Tobacco Prevention and Control funded agencies, contractors and partners.

Assessment of Need: Comprehensive Tobacco Prevention Cessation programs in communities across the state have demonstrated their efficacy to reduce death, disability, and economic burden caused by tobacco use.

Service Delivery Area: The Tobacco Prevention and Control Program will offer grants under two different components. Service Delivery Area: Component 1 will fund up to seven grantees within health systems in Alaska to work on health systems change for tobacco cessation. Component 2 will fund up to one grantee per public health region in Alaska (Anchorage, Gulf Coast, Interior, Mat-Su, Northern, Southeast, Southwest) to support tobacco prevention policy and development or expansion of a regional coalition.

Tuberculosis and Congenital Syphilis Prevention Grants**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 44.29.020; AS 47.05.010

The Tuberculosis and Congenital Syphilis Prevention Grants are part of the Governor's Healthy Families Initiative. The initiative aims to reduce the incidence of tuberculosis and eliminate congenital syphilis over 10 years. The grants will increase capacity for screening and treatment in high-incidence regions of the state, engage communities and health care providers, complete community assessments, focus prevention efforts on the highest risk populations, and facilitate screening and treatment by addressing health related social needs such as temporary housing and transportation, as well as enhancing access to substance misuse services and mental health services.

Assessment of Need: Alaska has the highest rate of tuberculosis in the U.S. During the first half of the 20th century, an epidemic of TB devastated Alaska's indigenous peoples, who continue to bear a disproportionate burden of the disease. Alaska ranked in the top ten states nationally for sexually transmitted diseases in recent years and, since 2020, has seen the highest number of congenital syphilis cases ever recorded in the state.

Service Delivery Area: The Tuberculosis and Congenital Syphilis Prevention Grants will offer grants under two different components: Component 1 will fund up to two grantees, one in each of two public health regions (Southwest and Northern) to focus on prevention of tuberculosis. Component 2 will fund up to four grantees within the Anchorage public health region and up to two grantees in Fairbanks and/or Mat Su to focus on prevention of congenital syphilis and other sexually transmitted infections.

Adult Day Services provide an organized program of services in a facility-based group setting, including supervision and a secure environment for individuals who experience Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders, physical, emotional and/or other cognitive impairments. Services incorporate person-centered planning approaches in response to an evaluation of the person's functional health, social needs, and interests. Adult Day Services are non-residential and occur during part of a day but less than 24 hours per day.

Assessment of Need: Adult Day Services provide supervised care during the day to eligible individuals at risk for institutionalization. Services provide therapeutic activities and supports programs that maintain or increase optimal mental and physical functioning. Additionally, services provide respite to caregivers to support continuing care at home, forestalling or avoiding the need for institutionalization. Expansion of Adult Day Services is needed to meet the needs of the increasing number of seniors with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders.

Services help families and caregivers to maintain the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders client at home, forestalling or preventing institutionalization. The scope of work includes education and dissemination of information about Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders to the general public, healthcare professionals, professional caregivers, agencies and organizations to increase awareness of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders. Additionally, the program links caregivers and agencies with resources available in their area to continue caring for the individual with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders in their home and community.

Assessment of Need: People with Dementia live an average of eight to ten years after diagnosis, and it is estimated that seven out of ten people with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders live at home. Alzheimer's afflicts one in ten persons over age 65 and nearly half of all people over 85, and it is estimated that by 2025 Alaska will have approximately 12,000 individuals diagnosed with an Alzheimer's Disease.

As required by AS 47.80.100, the Department must, within the limits of appropriation, implement a comprehensive system of services and facilities dispersed throughout the state. The services required under this statute are specialized and directed towards addressing habilitation and crises needs of individuals with developmental disabilities. This program provides wrap-around support interventions for adults with disabilities who have a history of victimization and remain at risk. Among the services provided are assessment, psychosocial skills training, socio-sexual skills training, clinical case management, and case consultation. Personal safety and risk reduction strategies are designed to assist individuals to live safely in their homes and communities. Behavioral risk management services are available for individuals with a history of inappropriate sexual behavior or victimization. Staff provide conference presentations, workshops, technical assistance and support, and are published writers in the area of disability and abuse.

Assessment of Need: Services are for individuals with developmental disabilities who display high risk or inappropriate behaviors and are at risk of institutionalization in corrections facilities, as well as individuals who, because of their disability, are more vulnerable to abuse. Training or support provided by this program must be accessible to direct service staff, school paraprofessionals, family members of people with disabilities, and other interested students in their home communities.

Funding received for the Developmental Disabilities Resource Connection (DDRC) Program provides services through DDRC agencies which educate and assist individuals who experience intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) as well as their families and caregivers on how to navigate various programs and services. DDRCs serve as the entry point for families into the state's Medicaid Waiver DD service system. Service providers explain the process and assist individuals and caregivers in completing the Person-Centered Intake (PCI), applying for DD eligibility program, submitting and updating DD Registration and Review forms and coordinating with other state and local programs. A portion of funding received will support one grantee, in addition to primary DDRCs, who demonstrates the ability to carry out program goals working with SDS and supporting other DDRCs providing statewide services to eligible individuals with developmental disabilities who have complex care needs that necessitate a time-limited good or service for which there is no other identified funding.

Assessment of Need: Developmental disabilities affect more than an estimated 11,600 Alaskan children, adults, and families according to the Governor's 2025 proclamation of March as Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month. The DDRC program was developed to assist individuals with developmental disabilities and their caregivers with navigating the multi-tiered application process so they can receive community-based supports in the least restrictive environment. The DDRCs are a critical part of Alaska DD Shared Vision Senate Bill (SB 174) to provide a flexible and person-centered system of supports to individuals with disabilities.

Service Delivery Area: Statewide. Six regional DDRC grant awards will be distributed. DDRC's are currently based in Anchorage, Kenai/Valdez/Cordova/Kodiak, Southeast Alaska, Bethel, Kotzebue, Matanuska-Susitna Borough, and Fairbanks North Star Borough. One additional statewide grant will be awarded to a regional DDRC grantee to administer the IDD Emergent Needs Fund and to provide statewide DDRC support.

The purpose of this grant program is to provide early intervention services to families of infants and toddlers (birth to third birthday) with disabilities and/or developmental delays to ensure improved outcomes and the development of natural supports for children and their families. Service delivery performance and program standards comply with the requirements of Part C the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program grantees will provide family-centered, home-based services that include developmental evaluation/assessments, service coordination, development of Individualized Family Service Plans, and educational and/or therapeutic services as determined by the Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program team.

Assessment of Need: Individuals with Disabilities Education Act requires that comprehensive early intervention services be available to eligible infants and toddlers and their families in all areas of the state. Approximately 3000 infants and toddlers are referred to the Infant Learning Program for services annually. Child Protection is the source of approximately 20% of those referrals. The Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act, reauthorized with the enactment of the Keeping Children and Families Safe Act of 2010 (P.L. 111- 320), requires referral of infants and toddlers to Part C early intervention who are: (a) The subject of a substantiated case of child abuse or neglect; or (b) Identified as directly affected by illegal substance abuse or withdrawal symptoms resulting from prenatal drug exposure.

EI/ILP Engagement Activities for At-Risk Children

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.20.060-AS 47.20.290 (Special Services for Certain Children), 7AAC 023 (Programs for Handicapped Children); 34 CFR Part 303 (Early Intervention Program for Infants & Toddlers with Disabilities), P.L. 111-320 - (Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act, CAPTA); 20 AAC 40.100 (Administration and operation of MHTAAR money).

This project will focus on the development and utilization of engagement and intake strategies which will increase the success of Early Intervention/ Infant Learning Program (EI/ILP) projects in engaging highly stressed caregivers in intake, screening and evaluation activities, and enrollment in EI/ILP services, if eligible. This project will work to remove barriers to participation by tailoring family engagement strategies for this group of children and families. These pre-enrollment activities will be designed to increase engagement of this often transient and reluctant group of families who have children who are at increased risk of developmental delays, disabilities, and early mental health/social emotional concerns. Target population for this project include infants and toddlers, ages birth to three years, who experience social, environmental and prenatal risk factors which put them at high risk of experiencing a disability. This includes Homeless children, and Child Abuse Protection and Treatment Act (CAPTA) referrals of children under the age of three who were the subject of a substantiated case of child abuse or neglect.

Assessment of Need: Approximately 25% of referrals into the Alaska Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program are for families involved in the Child Protection System. Families who experience significant social risk factors including homelessness, violence in the home, child abuse or neglect, parental substance abuse, lack of social supports, teen parents, and others, can be especially challenging to engage in EI/ILP Services. This may be due to lack of trust in service delivery systems, families who are overwhelmed with the stressors of daily living, transportation and communication challenges, and more. The project will work to remove system barriers and identify sustainable funding to support the work after grant funding fades over time.

Health Promotion and Disease Prevention

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Title III Older Americans Act (OAA); AS 47.05.010 Duties of the Department of Health and Social Services; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults

The Health Promotion and Disease Prevention program is aimed at reducing the risk of disease, disability, and injury to adults age 60 and older. The Health Promotion Disease Prevention program, funded through the Administration on Aging Title III-D, will improve the health and well-being of older Alaskan population and reduce costs of acute and long-term care by implementing evidence-based health promotion programs that promote prevention activities including self-management of chronic conditions, fall prevention, physical activity, and medication education, improve emotional and physical health, wellbeing, and sustain the ability to carry out activities of daily living so the person can remain at home.

Assessment of Need: Alaska has an increasing population of adults aged 60 and older. Most older adults have at least one chronic condition and many have multiple conditions. Adults over age 60 are increasingly likely to fall, which can result in loss of independence and entry into institutional care. There is increasing evidence that ongoing physical activity can slow the progress of and reduce the impact of disease. Through the Health Promotion Disease Prevention evidence-based programs, grantees will teach and empower older adults to take control of their health.

Senior and Disabilities Services Medicare Counseling and Outreach

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.24 Protection of Vulnerable Adults, AS 47.65 Service Program for older Alaskans and Other Adults, Federal Authorization: PL 101-508 certified at 42 USC 1395b-4, section 4360 of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990, 7 AAC 127.030(b), and 7 AAC 127.190(12).

Medicare Counseling and Outreach (MCO) grants provide coordination of Medicare outreach, counseling, referral, and data-entry activities consistent with the State Health Insurance Assistance Program and Senior Medicare Patrol grants. As an extension of the Medicare Information Office, they provide one-on-one Medicare counseling and public media outreach to seniors and people with disabilities. Counseling and referral are performed both on-site and over the phone, and outreach is provided off-site at community locations and events.

Assessment of Need: Availability of Medicare counseling and information for beneficiaries is essential for accessing necessary health care and medications. Demand for Medicare Counseling and Outreach has increased with the expanding senior population in Alaska. Grants under this program increase the capacity of the Division of Senior and Disabilities Medicare Information Office to the growing population.

Service Delivery Area: Funding will leverage existing certified Medicare counselors to support and assist the State Medicare Information Office in providing information to the largest populated areas of the state, and also to beneficiaries statewide.

National Family Caregiver Support

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (16) and (17) Duties of the Department; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults; Title III E of the Older Americans Act.

The National Family Caregiver Support program provides support for adult family members or other informal adult caregivers providing care to individuals 60 years of age and older; adult family members or other informal adult caregivers providing care to individuals of any age with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders; older relatives (not parents), age 55 and older, providing care to children under the age of 18; and older relatives, including parents, providing care to adults ages 18-59 with disabilities. National Family Caregiver Support services include providing information about available services, providing assistance in gaining access to services, individual counseling, organization of support groups, caregiver training, respite care, and supplemental services.

Assessment of Need: Family caregivers provide over \$450 billion per year in unpaid long term care services. The value of family caregivers will likely continue to be the largest source of long-term care services in the United States as the population over age 65 increases. Providing support to family caregivers may increase the length of time caregivers are able to care for their loved one at home.

The Nutrition, Transportation and Support Services Program grants provide the following services for older persons in accordance with the Alaska State Plan for Senior Services FY2026-FY2028: Congregate and Home Delivered Meals Assisted and Unassisted Transportation Homemaker Services Outreach, Information and Assistance Legal Services Media Services (provides partial funding for the Senior Voice) Volunteer Services- Senior Companion, Foster Grandparent/Elder Mentor, and Retired Senior Volunteer Programs Applicants for grants identify the target population as individuals with the greatest economic and social need with particular attention to older persons whose income falls below the federal poverty guideline, live alone, live in rural areas, and are frail as defined in Title III.

Assessment of Need: Seniors are at increased risk of institutionalization because of lack of basic supports to keep them healthy and independent in their homes. This grant acts to provide those community supports, such as meals, socialization, transportation and simple home supports to keep seniors healthy and, in their homes, avoiding institutionalization for as long as possible. The goal of the NTS grant is to help older Alaskans maintain a quality of life in a safe environment in their home communities, avoiding institutional placement, as long as possible. The grantees provide a daily hot nutritiously complete meal to keep older Alaskans physically and mentally healthy and to offset the rising cost of food in rural Alaska. The grantees provide a social environment to stave off the loneliness that can come with aging and living alone in rural communities. The grantees put eyes on the elders in their community to monitor their condition and their needs and connect them to other community and medical resources as needed. They provide transportation to get older Alaskans to doctors' appointments, the post office, the grocery store and community events. All of these services act to keep older Alaskans living safely in their home communities as long as possible.

**Senior and Disabilities Services
Protection and Advocacy**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Law 106-402 Americans with Disabilities Act; AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities

The Protection and Advocacy Program provides people with developmental disabilities and their families training and assistance in methods to resolve grievances they may have with providers of community developmental disability services. Services funded by the program range from Information and Referral, Negotiation and Mediation, various Interventions in line with Administrative Recourse and, as a last resort, Legal Consultation and Remedies. The program exists to assist eligible individuals, sometimes through their families and guardians, to engage in their own advocacy. In collaboration with the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services, this grant has been used to emphasize training to recipients in such areas as Special Education, Social Security and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The Senior In-Home (SIH) Services program provides case management and a menu of in-home services to eligible seniors needing assistance with activities of daily living or instrumental activities of daily living. The goal of the program is to support Alaskan seniors so that they may remain in their homes and communities for as long as possible thereby forestalling or eliminating more costly institutional care. Services include case management, service coordination, chore, respite, extended respite, and supplemental services.

Assessment of Need: These services offer a safety net for eligible seniors who do not meet the income requirement or level of care for Medicaid services or a Medicaid Waiver program, especially those with Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders (ADRD). By providing case management and in-home assistance, the SIH program is able to extend the time an individual can live independently in their own home and communities and reduce the need for costly institutional care. This continues to be very important as Alaska's senior population is now the fastest growing per capita in the United States.

This program provides funding to agencies who operate assisted living facilities. These facilities are located in rural areas without long-term care facilities or Pioneer Homes. Services provided by the assisted living homes are available to seniors sixty (60) and over, and individuals who are unable to live alone but can reside in a supervised setting with minimal assistance. Assisted living facilities enable seniors to live in or near their communities and provide meals and assistance with daily activities such as, bathing, dressing, transferring, and eating.

Assessment of Need: Elders who can no longer care for themselves in their own homes and do not have a caregiver to help them, must typically move to Anchorage or another large community to access assisted living care. Services provided by the assisted living homes in Tanana, Galena, and Unalakleet provide the necessary support for elders to remain close to their homes and communities.

Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury**

Granting Authority: 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.80.500 Statewide Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury Program

The Traumatic or Acquired Brain Injury (TABI) Grant Program includes (part A) Resource Facilitation and (part B) Supplemental Services (previously called mini-grants). Program Resource Facilitation and Peer Support includes coordinating resources, care, supports for individuals with brain injury to improve quality of life and maintain independence. The Peer Support component involves facilitating opportunities for individuals with a brain injury to receive support from trained individuals with lived experience. Five awards will be issued under the TABI program. Part A services will not be duplicated within a region. Part B services will include one service provider statewide. For the FY26-FY27 grant cycle, the Division seeks four Part A providers, and one Part B provider of TABI Services supported through grant funding. This GPA adds part B services to increase efficiency and access. Centralization of Supplemental Services (part B) offered through one agency will allow greater consistency of service provision. This part B grant award could be issued to one of four TABI regional Resource Facilitation/Peer Support (part A) agencies or could be awarded to a fifth eligible agency through the competitive solicitation process. All grant recipients are responsible for conducting outreach to the community regarding resources offered through this grant.

Assessment of Need: Alaska has one of the highest rates of brain injury in the nation. The Alaska Trauma Registry reports that every year approximately 2,500 new traumatic brain injury survivors join an estimated 10,000 to 12,000 Alaskans currently living with brain injury. Additionally, each year approximately 610 Alaskans are hospitalized, 150 individuals die, and an estimated 247 become permanently disabled due to a brain injury. Individuals who have experienced a brain injury have varying degrees of physical, cognitive, behavioral, and functional problems that impact their ability to live independently, causing difficulty gaining access to and utilizing health care providers, housing, employment, transportation, rehabilitation, and other home and community-based supports. Most people with Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury who leave acute care settings are discharged home, where they may need substantial assistance to regain needed skills and access resources. TABI Resource Facilitation, Peer Support, and Supplemental Services will provide a direct link between individuals with Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury and the services and supports that they need to maintain independence and achieve quality of life in their homes and communities.

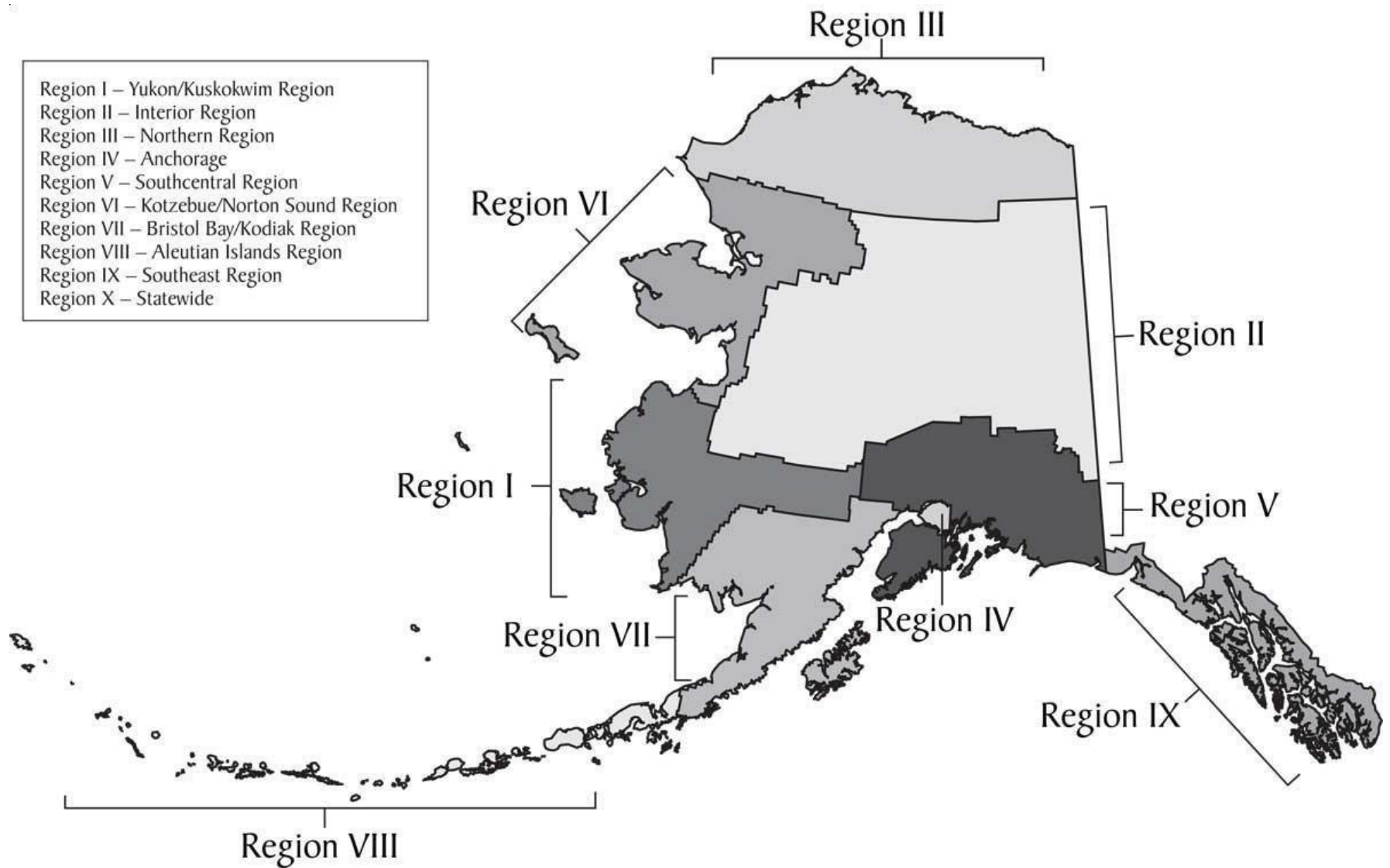
