
Steering Committee – through December 2023

Goal: to provide structure and support for regional workgroups to arrive at actionable recommendations to inform a larger statewide behavioral health roadmap for children, youth, and families.

Mission: The Steering Committee, comprised of key stakeholders and leaders, will help define the goals, outputs, timeline, and resources necessary for regional workgroups to make informed recommendations for prioritization of policy, funding structure, and resource allocation that will support a comprehensive system of care for children, youth, and families.

CONTINUUM OF SUPPORT SERVICES

A standard framework for discussing and understanding support services in schools is the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS). The MTSS was introduced in phase one of Mental Health Supports in Alaska Schools research and is revisited throughout phase two. SAMHSA outlines the MTSS through the framework's three tiers:

Intensive services for students identified as experiencing mental health or substance-related difficulties (i.e., family/caregiver treatment or other individualized interventions to address the identified illness or condition)

Targeted support for students exhibiting risk factors but without manifesting issues yet (i.e., more directed student screening and interventions to reduce the likelihood of issues developing)


Universally offered services (i.e., widespread screening, social emotional based learning curricula, and prevention-based activities)

The case studies include examples of how districts are approaching services at each tier of the MTSS framework through district programs, community provider programs, or a combination of both.

Implementation Workplan

The workplan is organized by three key domains with objectives and action items associated with each. The figure below identifies the objectives under each domain prioritized by the workgroup, with the top priorities in bold. The workplan is intended to be a living document to be used by AHHA, the Trust and other systems change leaders to support the design and implementation of a robust continuum of behavioral health services designed to meet the needs of children, adolescents and their families.

Figure 1: Prioritized Objectives for Building a Robust Continuum of Care





We share the stated goals for the waiver and are committed to working towards supporting successful implementation. Similarly, we recognize that the system of care is experiencing significant challenges. Based on stakeholder engagement, workgroup input, and firsthand experiences, we propose the recommendations below.

The 1115 Waiver is a demonstration waiver through the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare (CMS) which provides states with the flexibility to test out new and innovative approaches to providing care. Alaska's 1115 waiver was approved by CMS in November of 2018. We are currently in year 4 of the 5 year waiver.








In 5 years, what does a comprehensive behavioral health system of care look like for Interior youth?


