
READY TO RESPOND: Personal Preparedness

Ready to Respond is a guide to emergency planning and personal preparedness for those who provide services critical to the health, life, and safety of Alaskans. As a healthcare provider, or behavioral health specialist, you have a responsibility to be prepared. This will enable you to provide essential services and respond before, during, and after a disaster. Advance planning increases the chance that your family will remain safe during disasters and that you will be ready to respond.
