Alaska Public Health Alert

Procedures for Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Testing in Alaska March 10, 2020

Summary

The purpose of this alert is to update Alaska health care providers about new procedures and strategies for managing COVID-19 testing in Alaska given the ongoing global and national COVID-19 outbreak.

What's New for Alaska Providers

- Providers no longer need to call the Alaska Section of Epidemiology (SOE) to approve testing.
- Provider must fill out a <u>COVID-19 Report Form</u> for each patient regardless of which laboratory is performing testing.
- Updated CDC infection control guidance is available <u>here</u>.

Testing

Patients who have a <u>clinically compatible illness</u> (defined as fever and cough, or shortness of breath) AND at least one of the following criteria should be considered for testing:

Patient Criteria	Preferred Laboratory*
Had close contact to a laboratory-confirmed case of COVID-19	ASPHL
 Travelled (not airport transit) within the past 14 days to a location that has a <u>CDC Level 2 or 3 Travel Health Notice</u> or to a community where community transmission of COVID-19 is occurring⁺ 	ASPHL
Hospitalized	ASPHL
Lives in a long-term care facility	ASPHL
 Health care worker (negative influenza test) 	ASPHL
Individuals not meeting any of the above criteria:	
 A person with mild illness who is <u>at increased risk for serious illness</u> from COVID-19, for example, person older than 60 years, chronic medical conditions 	Commercial laboratory
Other patients as determined by clinical discretion	Commercial laboratory

*ASPHL laboratory supplies are limited, so please follow the preferred laboratory guidance closely. †This situation is rapidly changing; please refer to <u>CDC</u>, <u>WHO</u>, and other available resources to make this determination.

Currently there is widespread circulation of influenza, cold viruses, and RSV in Alaska. *Patients who are less likely to have had COVID-19 exposure for whom an alternate diagnosis has been confirmed may not need to be tested for COVID-19*.

Specimen Collection Information for ASPHL

- Specimen collection details are on page 23 of the <u>Laboratory Test Directory</u>.
- Instructions for obtaining a nasopharyngeal swab are available on page 95 of the directory.
- Specimens are batched and run daily; current turnaround time is 1–3 days, 7 days a week (this may vary depending on specimen volume and resources).
- Certain specimens may be run on a STAT basis, in consultation with SOE.
