Testing for Hepatitis C in Alaska

Why Get Tested?

- Roughly 75% of people who have hepatitis C are unaware of their infection.
- Most people with an acute hepatitis C infection do not have symptoms.
- Individuals may still transmit hepatitis C to others even if they do not feel any symptoms.
- Early detection allows for timely treatment of the disease before it develops into a more serious condition.
- When left untreated, chronic hepatitis C may lead to cirrhosis (scarring of the liver) and liver cancer. Fortunately, hepatitis C can be cured. <u>For more information</u>, see the Alaska Viral Hepatitis Resource Guide.

Populations Recommended for Hepatitis C Testing

- The following list details some of the highest risk populations for hepatitis C. For more complete information, see the CDC's Testing Recommendations for Chronic Hepatitis C Virus Infection webpage.
- Hepatitis C testing is recommended for the following populations:
 - o People born between 1945 and 1965
 - People born to mothers with hepatitis C
 - People with a history of multiple sex partners
 - o People with exposure to sexually transmitted diseases or infections
 - Men who have had sex with men
 - People who have ever used injection drugs
 - People living with HIV
 - People who have been exposed to needle sticks, sharps, or mucus from potentially HCVinfected sources
 - People with an amateur tattoo or piercing
 - o People who are or were long-term hemodialysis patients
 - People who received clotting factor concentrated produced before 1987
 - o People with persistently abnormal alanine aminotransferase (ALT) levels
 - People who received a blood transfusion or organ transplant before July 1992
